#### ACE/CTA/NEA Outdoor Naturalist Sunshine Proposal 1/10/24

The Association of Clovis Educators (ACE) looks forward to bargaining a Collective Bargaining Agreement (Agreement) with the Clovis Unified School District to assist the district in attracting and retaining the very best Naturalists to serve the community of Clovis Unified and provide the best outdoor school experience for Clovis Unified students and students from other districts. The following shall be the Sunshine Proposal from ACE/CTA/NEA for all matters to be bargained in the initial Agreement between the parties. These proposals are preliminary and will be subject to modification, addition, or deletion as appropriate through the negotiation process.

#### 1. Recognition

The employer, Clovis Unified School District, recognizes ACE/CTA/NEA as the exclusive representative of the Naturalist staff. This proposal uses the term "unit member" to denote all represented employees under this Agreement. The parties to this Agreement shall be the ACE/CTA/NEA and Clovis Unified School District.

#### 2. Negotiation Procedure

Procedures and timelines shall be established for all future contract negotiations that are efficient and yield meaningful outcomes.

#### 3. Association Rights

Association rights shall be established to ensure the Association's ability to fulfill its duties and responsibilities to its unit members and include unit members' input in decision-making regarding roles, expectations, and responsibilities, as well as decisions that impact students' access to quality education and the community's access to our district.

#### 4. Employee Rights

Employee rights ensure the fair treatment of employees and establish clear and mutually agreeable procedures.

#### 5. Maintenance of Standards

To ensure that the agreement is implemented in a way that does not eliminate any current benefits without explicit intent from the parties and treats all unit members equitably.

#### 6. Workload

To ensure a safe and effective working and educational outdoor environment for all unit members and students, reasonable workload standards will be established for each unit member to provide a safe <u>environment forand</u> students.

#### 7. Job Duties and Working Conditions

The parties shall:

- 1. Establish clarity, consistency, and fairness regarding job duties that yield a consistent standard of practices and expectations while allowing flexibility and autonomy within the role to best support student and site needs.
- 2. Provide a voice and equity in obtaining necessary support and resources for unit members to fulfill their roles.

#### 8. Hours of Employment

To ensure sustainability and quality of service, the parties shall establish clear terms of unit member work hours and work year, including substitute opportunities and appropriate flexibility, that enhance productivity and staff well-being. This includes overtime provisions.

#### 9. Assignments and Reassignment

The parties shall establish clear and equitable procedures for the assignment of our unit members that include the Naturalists' voice so that all students have equal and appropriate access to quality outdoor education.

#### 10. Wages

The parties shall establish fair salary schedules that will help with the recruitment and retention of highly qualified Naturalists, including criteria for appropriate placement on the salary schedules and compensation for additional qualifications, experience, work duties, and responsibilities to promote longevity and professional excellence.

#### 11. Health & Welfare Benefits

The parties shall establish fair benefits packages that will maintain or improve the current employee benefits; including but not limited to eligibility criteria, medical benefits, dental benefits, vision benefits, and life insurance for full-time and part-time employees.

#### 12. Leaves of Absence

To support the mental and physical well-being of employees and their families, the parties shall develop leave policies, including but not limited to:

- a. Sick leave
- b. Personal leave
- c. Family medical leave
- d. Parental leave
- e. Bereavement leave
- f. Leave for jury duty
- g. Court witness leaves
- h. Military leave
- i. Unpaid leave
- i. Sabbatical leave
- k. Catastrophic illness/injury leave

#### 13. Evaluation

To promote a positive culture with diverse and high-quality employees, the parties shall establish a meaningful procedure for employee evaluation that includes timelines, frequency of evaluation, clear and objective criteria, observation procedures, and a process for the mutual determination of evaluation goals, progress checks, and remediation plans if necessary.

#### 14. Safety

The parties shall establish procedures ensuring safe conditions for supporting students, including a means to report unsafe situations that work to improve the students' experience.

#### 15. Curriculum and Program Input

The Agreement shall recognize the importance of Naturalists' input in the development and implementation of curriculum and program content to enhance the educational experience and meet state and district standards.

#### 16. Collective Bargaining Agreement Enforcement Procedure (Grievance Procedure)

The parties shall establish a procedure to resolve differences over the enforcement of this Agreement with preference to resolving differences at the lowest possible level, and with progressive steps to allow resolution up to and including binding arbitration.

#### 17. Personnel Files

The parties shall establish consistent, transparent, and fair procedures for maintaining personnel files, including procedures regarding complaints that may arise from unit members, teachers, parents, or students.




## What is LCAP?







### **Analyzing and Understanding the Table for "Met or Exceeded"**



#### **English Language Arts**

#### **All Students**

Explore how well students are meeting grade-level standards on the English Language Arts assessment. This measure is based on student performance on either the Smarter Balanced Summative Assessment or the California Alternate Assessment, which is taken annually by students in grades 3–8 and grade 11.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

The Expanded Learning Club (ELC) program in Clovis Unified is funded through the State's Expanded Learning Opportunities Program (ELO-P) fund to provide free access to before- and after-school enrichment activities as well as learning opportunities for unduplicated pupils in Transitional Kindergarten through grade six at all elementary schools.

The program plan will provide the following opportunities for students and staff:

- An ELC Leadership Team to ensure program implementation meets the Expanded Learning quality standards
- Before- and after-school enrichment activities and learning opportunities at all 35 elementary sites during the school year
- A minimum of 30 days of full-day program during the intersession
- Transitional Kindergarten and Kindergarten students will have access to a nine-hour program
- Ongoing staff trainings
- Maintain and/or add facilities to meet the needs of increasing enrollment

Implementation began in 2022-23 with the original apportionment of \$7,000.000. The ongoing funding will be utilized to grow ELC programs by serving more students each year; hiring, training, providing ongoing professional development for ELC staff; and enhancing the program facilities.

Clovis Unified School District utilizes the Expanded Learning Opportunities Program (ELOP) fund to create the Expanded Learning Club (ELC) program, providing students at all 35 elementary schools with high-quality academic support and enriching opportunities beyond the school day.

In ELC, health and safety are prioritized through school-aligned procedures reviewed during staff training at the start of the school year. Each site is equipped with first aid kits and safety clipboards containing emergency protocols, contact information, and current student rosters. Staff members are required to wear their CUSD badge, uniform shirt, whistles, walkie-talkie, first aid fanny pack and have the safety clipboard with them during program hours. Quarterly safety drills further ensure preparedness.

The health needs of students are carefully managed by the Child Development nurse, who reviews health records for all program participants. The nurse collaborates with each school's health office to share and implement appropriate safety plans during program hours. Additionally, the nurse provides tailored training for staff to address the unique health needs of students. Site leads are CPR/First Aid certified as part of their ongoing training.

Other safety measures include a comprehensive registration process, parent sign-in and sign-out protocols, attendance tracking system, head count every 20 minutes, incident and accident reporting procedures, and release procedures aligned with District's policies. Safety protocols are detailed in the <a href="Staff Handbook">Staff Handbook</a> and reviewed monthly at site meetings.

### **Emotionally Safe & Supportive**

Describe how the program provides an emotionally safe and supportive environment for students. This may include how the program incorporates social emotional learning.

ELC aims to empower students and foster a sense of success by equipping them with academic and social skills. To create a safe and supportive environment, ongoing collaborative meetings are held with site administration. Additionally, the partnership between parents, ELC staff, and teachers plays a crucial role in identifying each student's strengths, interests, and learning styles.

Site leads work closely with their teams to implement a positive behavior management system based on clear program expectations. Where feasible, staff are trained in behavior intervention programs and social emotional learning curriculum such as Second Step.

### 2—Active and Engaged Learning

Explain how the program will provide opportunities for students to experience active and engaged learning that either supports or supplements, but does not duplicate, the instructional day.

Hands-on lessons and activities are designed based on student interests. Students are regularly involved in projects and activities that increase understanding and use of creativity, critical thinking, and information and communication technology. A specific focus is placed on Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math (STEM) topics, as well as art (both performing and visual) and Social-Emotional Learning (SEL) skills. A variety of collaborative partnerships are established with community vendors through annual contracts to support the enrichment program component.

### 3—Skill Building

Detail how the program will provide opportunities for students to experience skill building.

ELC provides daily opportunities for students to build essential skills through structured and engaging activities. During academic support, students may have up to one hour to complete their homework under the guidance of staff. To further enhance literacy development, students can utilize supplemental resources such as Accelerated Reader (AR), and iReady. The health and wellness component focuses on fostering physical development by engaging students in activities that build gross motor skills or sport-specific abilities. Enrichment activities are designed to promote critical thinking, teamwork, and leadership. Students participate in problem-solving tasks, collaborate with peers in group settings, and practice age-appropriate social skills through team-based or peer-led activities. To address specific academic needs, credentialed teachers are recruited to provide targeted intervention aligned with California State Content Standards. These lessons may include assessments to monitor and support student progress effectively.

### 4—Youth Voice and Leadership

Describe how the program will provide opportunities for students to engage in youth voice and leadership. Consider and describe what opportunities youth have to lead activities or provide mentorship within the program. Address how youth are included in program quality assessment and improvement.

Students are encouraged to share their viewpoints, concerns, or interests in many ways enabling the staff to shape program expectations and practices that reflect student input. Staff may utilize informal and/or formal surveys to gather feedback on activities students would like to explore in ELC. Student leaders play an active role by facilitating enrichment activities such as gardening club, service-based learning projects, and talent shows, fostering a sense of ownership and collaboration within the program.

### 5—Healthy Choices and Behaviors

Explain how the program will provide opportunities for students to engage in healthy choices and behaviors. Include the plan to provide nutritious meals and snacks and how opportunities for physical activity will be provided.

Through a partnership with the District's Campus Catering Department, ELC ensures all participating students have access to nutritious snacks and meals. The staff work closely with the school to align their healthy practices and program activities with the school wellness plan. Physical education and fitness activities are incorporated into the daily schedule. To further enrich the program, teachers are contracted by stipends to provide age-appropriate competitive athletic opportunities for students in grades four through six. These sports activities are offered on a quarterly basis, providing students with structured and engaging athletic experiences.

### 6—Diversity, Access, and Equity

All elementary school students are eligible to participate in ELC. Key information such as program schedules, fees, locations, and the parent handbook are regularly updated and available on the Clovis Unified School District website under the Child Development Department tab. Each school's homepage includes a direct link to the Child Development website where information is available in multiple languages to ensure accessibility for all families.

Program supervisors are intentional in hiring staff who reflect the diversity of the student population. Staff members are trained and encouraged to build positive relationships with students and their families. The program celebrates the diverse cultures and backgrounds of its students through activities and lessons that promote inclusivity and acceptance.

A strong partnership between parents, site administration, and program supervisors is essential for identifying and addressing the needs of students facing academic or behavioral challenges, including those with Individualized Educational Plans (IEPs). The Behavior Consultation Team (BCT), consisting of a psychologist and two paraprofessionals, serves as a vital resource for supporting both staff and students. The BCT offers expertise by assessing challenging situations and coaching staff through strategies to support students with significant difficulties. When needed, intervention strategies may include hiring additional staff to ensure specific student needs are met effectively.

### 7—Quality Staff

### **Staff Engagement**

The ELC leadership team is committed to recruiting, hiring, and retaining high-quality staff. All candidates must meet the District's minimum requirements and undergo a rigorous interview process before being offered a position. New hires are required to complete a mandatory onboarding training program before beginning their site assignments. To ensure staff effectiveness, all new employees are evaluated twice during their probationary period and must meet established job performance standards to achieve permanent status. Once permanent, staff members undergo annual evaluations to maintain a consistent standard of excellence. Program supervisors conduct regular walk-through observations to provide timely feedback to staff, ensuring continuous professional growth.

### **Minimum Staff Qualifications**

The <u>Child Development Aide</u> is the entry level position for staff working in ELC. The minimum qualifications include being 18 years old, having a high school diploma or GED and successfully passing the background check process. The Aide works under the direction of an Instructor, or Site Lead.

To maximize the benefits of the learning opportunities provided by ELC, the program maintains a student-to-staff ratio of no more than 17:1 for grades one through six and 10:1 for Transitional Kindergarten and Kindergarten. Staffing needs at each site are determined by the number of enrolled students, ensuring compliance with these ratio guidelines. Once the required staffing levels are met, team members are strategically paired based on their individual strengths and assigned to appropriate grade levels. This approach to staffing ensures that students receive the best support and guidance based on their developmental needs.

### **Staff Development**

Building staff capacity is an ongoing, year-round process designed to ensure program quality and professional growth. Training topics cover a wide range of essential areas, including program policies, safety procedures, expanded learning quality standards, technology resources, lesson planning, fostering positive classroom environments, and implementing the Second Step curriculum, among others. Strategies and best practices introduced during these trainings are actively applied in the program and reviewed during monthly site meetings.

Staff members serving in specialized roles, such as Site Lead, Instructor Lead 1, or TK/K instructors, participate in additional targeted trainings throughout the year to address the unique demands of their positions.

In addition to district-required online training courses and monthly site trainings, all staff members are strongly encouraged to participate in the following annual training opportunities:

**August** – Staff Orientation

October – All Staff Training

January – All Staff Training

**June** (Last day of school) – All Staff Training (ELC closes at 3pm.)

### 8—Clear Vision, Mission, and Purpose

**Vision**: Clovis Unified School District's Expanded Learning Club strives to be the benchmark for excellence in Expanded Learning programs for students in elementary school.

**Mission**: The mission of Expanded Learning Club is to provide a safe and supportive expanded learning environment that fosters educational and enrichment opportunities for all students.

**Purpose**: ELC offers a well-rounded experience through its three core components: **academic support**, **health and wellness**, and **enrichment**.

<u>Academic Support</u>: This component includes homework assistance and targeted academic intervention tailored to focus areas identified by each school site. <u>Health and Wellness</u>: Students engage in physical fitness activities and health education while also receiving a nutritious snack to support their overall well-being. <u>Enrichment:</u> This component is designed to inspire creativity and features STEM activities, clubs, community events, service-learning projects, and partnerships with local organizations.

This comprehensive approach ensures that students benefit academically, physically, and socially while participating in engaging and meaningful experiences.

### 9—Collaborative Partnerships

### Students and Families

Feedback on program quality is gathered through annual surveys from parents, students, staff, teachers, and administrators. Once needs are identified, along with potential solutions, site administrators and program supervisors collaborate to develop actionable recommendations. The ELC leadership team then works to implement these solutions, ensuring that the program effectively addresses the priorities of its stakeholders and meets the needs of the school community it serves.

Family engagement is a key priority for the program, fostering strong connections between families and ELC. The Child Development Department uses Parent Square, a digital communication platform, to promote and inform all elementary families about the ELC program.

From formal parent information meetings to informal meet-and-greets, program supervisors and site leads ensure parents understand the program expectations. Daily interactions during the student sign-in and sign-out process provide an opportunity for staff to share highlights of each student's day, creating a personal and consistent connection with families.

Site leads also keep families informed by sharing program updates and achievements through a monthly newsletter. Additionally, parents are encouraged to participate in ELC events such as Lights On Afterschool, the multicultural fair, and book launch celebrations, further strengthening their involvement and connection to the program.

### **Community Based Organizations and other Non-LEA Partners**

Once services are delivered, feedback is gathered from students, staff, and site administrators to assess the impact of the learning experience. This feedback informs decisions regarding the renewal or adjustment of contracts for future services.

ELC conducts a formal annual program assessment based on the 12 Quality Standards of Expanded Learning in California. The program data and evaluation results are shared with educational partners for feedback. The ELC leadership team collects and utilizes data to influence program planning and goal setting. Evaluation outcomes are used to prioritize future work around program design, professional development, and program practices. Results from the assessment are the driving force behind the Continuous Quality Improvement (CQI) Action Plan. CQI Action Plans are created in the Fall and implemented throughout the Spring.

Clovis Unified School District utilizes the Expanded Learning Opportunities Program fund to establish the *Expanded Learning Club* (ELC) program to provide quality academic support and enrichment opportunities outside of the school day for students at all 35 elementary schools in the district.

Program supervisors are responsible for ensuring that their assigned sites meet all requirements for providing academic support, enrichment, and health and wellness activities. They maintain records of lesson plans, sign-in/sign-out sheets, and manage the instructional supply budget for their respective sites, ensuring that resources are effectively allocated to support program goals.

The ELC business support team works closely with program supervisors to manage and track student applications, program rosters, schedule change requests, and requests to add or drop service days. They also handle the processing of monthly fees for families who are not eligible for a fee waiver, ensuring efficient and accurate administrative support for the program.

### Budget

Of the ELOP apportionment received, 60% is allocated to personnel costs, 30% is designated for instructional supplies and operating expenses, and the remaining 10% is reserved for building improvements. Monthly expenditures are closely tracked, and the year-to-date budget is regularly reviewed and adjusted to address projected areas of need.

An effective management and fiscal organizational structure is in place to implement policies, procedures, and practices that ensure the successful operation of ELC programs in alignment with program goals, vision, and design. The ELC leadership team, consisting of the Director, Assistant Director, multiple program supervisors, and the business support team, collaborates to ensure compliance with local, state, and federal guidelines. Weekly leadership meetings are held to review ongoing staffing and operational needs at each site, ensuring the program runs smoothly and efficiently.

Pinedale and Sierra Vista are the two elementary schools that receive the ASES and 21<sup>st</sup> CCLC grants. All personnel costs are split-funded by both grants. Instructional materials, enrichment opportunities, and other operational costs are funded through ELO-P.

### Transitional Kindergarten and Kindergarten

ELC provides the Transitional Kindergarten (TK) students and Kindergarten (K) students in need, a nine-hour program at all 35 elementary school sites.

**Recruitment and Training:** The ELC staff serving the TK/K programs have prior work experience with this age group and/or have obtained Early Childhood Education credits. The staff participates monthly in targeted training such as Teaching Pyramid, to support their understanding and implementation of developmentally appropriate practices.

**Curriculum:** The ELC staff collaborates closely with the Preschool team, and the TK/K teacher teams to develop experiences that meet the unique needs of Transitional Kindergarten and Kindergarten students.

### Offer and Provide Access

To participate in ELC, students must be fully enrolled in Clovis Unified School District. In March, program supervisors host parent information meetings at each elementary school to provide details about ELC and guide families through the application process. Informational flyers, translated in Spanish and Hmong are distributed to parents within each school community. Interpreters are available during these meetings to accommodate the language needs of parents.

Beginning in April, the ELC digital application becomes accessible to parents through their Parent Connect portal. During the application process, laptops and technology support are provided to parents as needed. Priority access to the application and acceptance into program is given to students identified as unduplicated pupils. Waitlists are created when available program capacity is reached, based on facilities and staffing needs.

ELC operates at all elementary schools, therefore transportation is not needed during the 180 school days. However, for the Full Day Programs offered during non-school days, transportation is available to students from their home school to the program site.

### Field Trips

Field trips for entertainment purposes are not allowable. However, field trips can be a valuable educational and enrichment experience for youth. ELC schedules field trips to provide educational opportunities for students with real world experiences that enhance learning in the areas of health and wellness, academic support and enrichment. By working closely with the transportation department, ELC has off-site field trips scheduled mainly during the 30 nonschool days as culminating experiences related to the themes of study. Field trips are age appropriate and include all program participants.

Anticipated field trips include the Fresno Chaffee Zoo, Sierra Outdoor School, United Skates, Maya Cinema, and college visits. Field trips will be reflected in the weekly curriculum plan and highlight the intended learning outcomes.

### **Program Fees**

Every student attending a school operating a program is eligible to participate in the program. Programs may charge family fees. ELC is a fee-based program. Fees are posted on the <u>Child Development website</u>. Monthly fees are charged based on program and utilization. All students identified as unduplicated pupils have access to ELC at no cost.

  When a local educational agency contracts with a third party, the local educational agency shall require the third party to request from parents or guardians pupil health information, such as whether a pupil has allergies or asthma, before pupil enrollment. Parents or guardians may provide this information at their discretion and are not required to provide pupil health information for the pupil to receive services pursuant to this article.

### **SUMMARY**

Under general supervision, leads and participates in the production of high-volume reproduction and duplication services including short- and long-term scheduling. Works with media and design software and communicates with district personnel to complete requests in accordance with requested order specifications. Operates, maintains, and repairs a variety of offset press and computer-aided equipment used for printing and copying printed materials. Work is performed with some independence and use of some independent judgment. Position is reviewed through observation of the work in progress and results obtained.

### **DISTINGUISHING CAREER FEATURES**

Under the direction of the Supervisor, Graphic Arts, the Document Processing Specialist is a lead-level position with partial leadership duties over a small team of Technicians. Manages the production of graphic arts, printing and duplication and the processing of work orders. Operates in a fast-paced, production-oriented environment and is focused on providing excellent customer service, meeting tight timelines and schedules, and insuring the availability of materials from either an outside vendor or from within the district warehouse. Proficiency in computerized graphic design and layout techniques, principles and practice of document enlargements and reductions, network computer skills, and copier programming skills are necessary. Must be a team player and possess strong attention to detail and the ability to handle multiple projects with tight deadlines while communicating information to both coworkers and customers in an accurate and timely fashion. Advancement opportunities will require additional training or experience in supervisory and management processes.

### ESSENTIAL DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

- Creates, designs, performs retouching and manipulation of images and documents and works with district personnel on layouts of publications.
- Works with a wide range of media and design software to provide flexibility on all printing needs of district personnel.
- Assists with receiving maintenance and repair services with various service technicians.
- Receives and reviews incoming job orders. Plans, organizes, and schedules graphic arts and duplicating work. Works with Supervisor to establish timelines and workflow. Evaluates quality and quantity of services rendered and received. May inspect completed jobs to ensure work meets requested specifications, quality standards, and quantity requirements.
- Confers with Supervisor regarding paper stock, duplicating materials, and equipment. Receives supplies and verifies invoices with shipments and stock supplies.

- Assists in the collection of information in order to help prepare various reports related to operations and activities within the Graphic Arts Department. Collaborates with staff on operation of printing and duplication equipment.
- Manages multiple projects/duties simultaneously. Produces high-quality printed materials by operating offset presses, high-speed copying, or other copy machines, collating machine, binding equipment or other peripheral printing equipment. Position is subject to continuous loud noise levels.

### ACE/CTA/NEA Outdoor Naturalist Sunshine Proposal 1/10/24

The Association of Clovis Educators (ACE) looks forward to bargaining a Collective Bargaining Agreement (Agreement) with the Clovis Unified School District to assist the district in attracting and retaining the very best Naturalists to serve the community of Clovis Unified and provide the best outdoor school experience for Clovis Unified students and students from other districts. The following shall be the Sunshine Proposal from ACE/CTA/NEA for all matters to be bargained in the initial Agreement between the parties. These proposals are preliminary and will be subject to modification, addition, or deletion as appropriate through the negotiation process.

### 1. Recognition

The employer, Clovis Unified School District, recognizes ACE/CTA/NEA as the exclusive representative of the Naturalist staff. This proposal uses the term "unit member" to denote all represented employees under this Agreement. The parties to this Agreement shall be the ACE/CTA/NEA and Clovis Unified School District.

### 2. Negotiation Procedure

Procedures and timelines shall be established for all future contract negotiations that are efficient and yield meaningful outcomes.

### 3. Association Rights

Association rights shall be established to ensure the Association's ability to fulfill its duties and responsibilities to its unit members and include unit members' input in decision-making regarding roles, expectations, and responsibilities, as well as decisions that impact students' access to quality education and the community's access to our district.

### 4. Employee Rights

Employee rights ensure the fair treatment of employees and establish clear and mutually agreeable procedures.

### 5. Maintenance of Standards

To ensure that the agreement is implemented in a way that does not eliminate any current benefits without explicit intent from the parties and treats all unit members equitably.

### 6. Workload

To ensure a safe and effective working and educational outdoor environment for all unit members and students, reasonable workload standards will be established for each unit member to provide a safe <u>environment forand</u> students.

### 7. Job Duties and Working Conditions

The parties shall:

- 1. Establish clarity, consistency, and fairness regarding job duties that yield a consistent standard of practices and expectations while allowing flexibility and autonomy within the role to best support student and site needs.
- Provide a voice and equity in obtaining necessary support and resources for unit members to fulfill their roles.

### 8. Hours of Employment

To ensure sustainability and quality of service, the parties shall establish clear terms of unit member work hours and work year, including substitute opportunities and appropriate flexibility, that enhance productivity and staff well-being. This includes overtime provisions.

### 9. Assignments and Reassignment

The parties shall establish clear and equitable procedures for the assignment of our unit members that include the Naturalists' voice so that all students have equal and appropriate access to quality outdoor education.

### 10. Wages

The parties shall establish fair salary schedules that will help with the recruitment and retention of highly qualified Naturalists, including criteria for appropriate placement on the salary schedules and compensation for additional qualifications, experience, work duties, and responsibilities to promote longevity and professional excellence.

### 11. Health & Welfare Benefits

The parties shall establish fair benefits packages that will maintain or improve the current employee benefits; including but not limited to eligibility criteria, medical benefits, dental benefits, vision benefits, and life insurance for full-time and part-time employees.

### 12. Leaves of Absence

To support the mental and physical well-being of employees and their families, the parties shall develop leave policies, including but not limited to:

- a. Sick leave
- b. Personal leave
- c. Family medical leave
- d. Parental leave
- e. Bereavement leave
- f. Leave for jury duty
- g. Court witness leaves
- h. Military leave
- i. Unpaid leave
- i. Sabbatical leave
- k. Catastrophic illness/injury leave

#### 13. Evaluation

To promote a positive culture with diverse and high-quality employees, the parties shall establish a meaningful procedure for employee evaluation that includes timelines, frequency of evaluation, clear and objective criteria, observation procedures, and a process for the mutual determination of evaluation goals, progress checks, and remediation plans if necessary.

### 14. Safety

The parties shall establish procedures ensuring safe conditions for supporting students, including a means to report unsafe situations that work to improve the students' experience.

### 15. Curriculum and Program Input

The Agreement shall recognize the importance of Naturalists' input in the development and implementation of curriculum and program content to enhance the educational experience and meet state and district standards.

### 16. Collective Bargaining Agreement Enforcement Procedure (Grievance Procedure)

The parties shall establish a procedure to resolve differences over the enforcement of this Agreement with preference to resolving differences at the lowest possible level, and with progressive steps to allow resolution up to and including binding arbitration.

### 17. Personnel Files

The parties shall establish consistent, transparent, and fair procedures for maintaining personnel files, including procedures regarding complaints that may arise from unit members, teachers, parents, or students.

### 18. Professional Development

The parties shall establish clear procedures for providing equitable and appropriate professional development and other career support opportunities to develop professional skills and practices.

### 19. Savings Clause

If any portion of this contract is rendered null and void by a court of competent jurisdiction or by a change in legislation, then the remaining portions of this contract remain in full effect.

### 20. Term of Agreement (or "Effect of Agreement")

The parties shall establish the terms of this Agreement and a process for opening negotiations for a successor Agreement.

### CLOVIS UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT'S INITIAL PROPOSAL

Clovis Unified School District ("District") intends to collectively bargain the following matters with the Association of Clovis Educators Naturalists, (ACE). As this will be the initial bargaining agreement between the parties, the District's initial proposals reflect its general intent to negotiate a new bargaining agreement and specific provisions will be developed during the negotiation process.

- 10. Health Benefits the District intends to negotiate fair and reasonable provisions regarding health benefits that serve the best interests of the District and employees.
- 11. Leaves the District intends to negotiate various leave provisions consistent with legal requirements and the leaves already provided to District employees.
- 12. Evaluations the District intends to negotiate fair and reasonable evaluation procedures.
- 13. Personnel Files the District intends to negotiate fair and reasonable provisions regarding employee personnel files.
- 14. Grievance Procedure the District intends to negotiate a fair and reasonable grievance procedure that allows for the internal resolution of differences at the lowest level possible.
- 15. Safety the District intends to negotiate appropriate language regarding safety of employees.

- 16. Dues Deduction the District intends to negotiate appropriate language regarding the deduction of dues from bargaining unit members.
- 17. Concerted Activities the District intends to negotiate language pertaining to concerted activities.

# RESOLUTION NO. 4034 BEFORE THE GOVERNING BOARD OF THE CLOVIS UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT FRESNO COUNTY, CALIFORNIA

# DETERMINING THAT PUBLIC INTEREST AND NECESSITY REQUIRE ACQUISITION OF RIGHT OF WAY IN REAL PROPERTY FOR PUBLIC PURPOSE AND AUTHORIZING PROCEEDINGS IN EMINENT DOMAIN

WHEREAS, the Governing Board of the Clovis Unified School District (the "Board" and the "District," respectively) determines that it is necessary to acquire a right of way in certain real property within the County of Fresno located on the northwest corner of the intersection of East Shields Avenue and North De Wolf Avenue, bearing Assessor's Parcel Number (APN) 310-230-25, which right of way is more particularly described as set forth in Exhibit A and depicted in Exhibit B (the "Right of Way"); and

WHEREAS, this Resolution of Necessity (the "Resolution") is for the acquisition of a right of way consisting of approximately 3,405 square feet from APN 310-230-25. The Right of Way is required by the County of Fresno for public street improvement purposes related to the development and operation of the Terry P. Bradley Educational Center by the District on the east side of North Leonard Avenue, north and south of the Clinton Avenue alignment, as a general statement of the public use (the "Project"); and

**WHEREAS**, the District has made a pre-condemnation offer to acquire the Right of Way for the Project as provided by law; and

WHEREAS, the District has made numerous attempts prior to and following its precondemnation offer to acquire the Right of Way by negotiation with the owners of record; and

WHEREAS, a notice of hearing for the proposed adoption of the Resolution was mailed to the owners of record of the Right of Way in accordance with Eminent Domain Law (Code of Civ. Proc., §§ 1230.010 et seq.). The notice of hearing advised the owners of record of the right to be heard on the matters referred to therein on the date, time and place stated in the notice; and

**WHEREAS**, the hearing described in the notice was held at the Board meeting on February 19, 2025, and all interested persons having had an opportunity to be heard, the hearing was closed and the matter considered by the Board for decision, all as required by law; and

**WHEREAS**, the Board has received the staff report and considered all relevant factors and information bearing on the findings herein.

**NOW, THEREFORE**, the Governing Board of Clovis Unified School District, by a vote of not less than two-thirds of its members, declares, finds and resolves as follows:

**SECTION 1**. The foregoing recitals are true and correct and, by this reference, incorporated herein as if set forth in full. The staff report, all references and documents referred to therein, including any and all oral testimony and presentation in support of the Resolution (collectively, the "staff report") is also incorporated herein by reference.

**SECTION 2**. The District is authorized to acquire the Right of Way for the Project by eminent domain proceedings pursuant to Section 35270.5 of the Education Code and Section 19 of Article 1 of the California Constitution.

**SECTION 3**. Based upon the foregoing, the Board specifically finds, determines and declares that:

- a. The public interest and necessity require the proposed Project.
- b. The proposed Project is planned or located in the manner that will be most compatible with the greatest public good and the least private injury.
  - c. The Right of Way is necessary for the proposed Project.
- d. Offers to acquire the Right of Way were made to the owners of record as provided by law, including Government Code 7267.2, prior to adopting the Resolution.
- **SECTION 4**. The Right of Way is completely within the territorial boundaries of the Clovis Unified School District situated in Fresno County, State of California.

**SECTION 5**. For the purpose of this Resolution, the owners of record of the Right of Way, as known to the District, are Dominic A. De La Cerda, Liz Andrade, and Diane M. De La Cerda.

**SECTION 6.** The Right of Way shall be acquired in the name of the Clovis Unified School District.

**SECTION 7.** Counsel for the District is authorized and directed to institute and conduct to conclusion, in the name of the District, proceedings in eminent domain in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution of the State of California and the Code of Civil Procedure and to acquire, in the name of the District pursuant to Section 35270.5 of the Education Code, and Section 19 of Article 1 of the California Constitution, a fee simple estate in and to the Right of

Way. In the event the Right of Way is acquired through an escrow transfer of title, the acquisition is hereby declared to be in lieu of eminent domain proceedings and under threat of eminent domain.

**SECTION 8.** The District's legal counsel, upon further advice and consent of the Clovis Unified School District through its Superintendent, or Associate Superintendent, Administrative Services, is authorized to deposit the probable amount of compensation with the Treasurer of the State of California, to seek an order for a prejudgment possession if needed, and to perform all other acts as necessary to acquire the Property in eminent domain proceedings.

Thence along said parallel line, North 00°24'03" East, a distance of 119.46 feet;

Thence South 89°35'57" East, a distance of 5.97 feet;

Thence North 05°13'35" East, a distance of 95.42 feet to the west right of way line of North De Wolf Avenue, said west right of way line being 30.00 feet west of said east line of Section 23;

Thence along said west right of way line of North De Wolf Avenue, South 00°24′03″ West, a distance of 236.55 feet to the beginning of a tangent curve, concave to the northwest and having a radius of 10.00 feet;

Thence southwesterly along said curve, through a central angle of 90°07'38", and an arc length of 15.73 feet to said north right of way line of East Shields Avenue;


Thence along said north right of way line of East Shields Avenue, North 89°28'19" West, a distance of 121.95 feet to the TRUE POINT OF BEGINNING.

# STAFF REPORT FOR ADOPTION OF A RESOLUTION OF NECESSITY (TERRY P. BRADLEY EDUCATIONAL CENTER RIGHT OF WAY PROJECT)

# February 19, 2025

#### RECOMMENDATION

Adopt Resolution of Necessity, Resolution No. 4034 (the "Resolution"), determining that the public interest and necessity require the acquisition of a right of way in real property within the County of Fresno consisting of approximately 3,405 square feet for public street improvements and right of way purposes and authorizing the District to proceed in eminent domain. The owners of record of the right of way property are Dominic A. De La Cerda, Liz Andrade, and Diane M. De La Cerda (the "Owners"). The Resolution requires approval by at least a two-thirds majority of all the Board (five affirmative votes).

# **DISCUSSION**

# A. Project Description

The District is in the process of constructing the Terry P. Bradley Educational Center ("Educational Center") on approximately 160.46 gross acres in the County of Fresno, generally located on the east side of North Leonard Avenue, north and south of the Clinton Avenue alignment, to consist of a high school, middle school and related facilities. An elementary school is also planned for a future phase of the project. The Educational Center project also includes infrastructure and traffic improvements necessary to serve the site and to mitigate the impacts of the project development and operation.

In conjunction with the development of the Educational Center, the District must acquire a right of way on the northwest corner of the intersection of East Shields and North De Wolf avenues for public street improvement purposes (the "Project"). The right of way to be acquired consist of approximately 3,405 square feet from Assessor's Parcel Number ("APN") 310-230-25 (the "Right of Way"). The District has made offers to purchase the Right of Way for fair market value. To date the Owners have not accepted the District's offers.

# **B.** Requirements Necessary to Acquire Property Through the Eminent Domain Process

As set forth in the Resolution, the Board of Trustees ("Board") must make the following findings:

1. The public interest and necessity require the Project;

- 2. The Project is planned or located in the manner that would be most compatible with the greatest public good and the least private injury;
  - 3. The Right of Way sought to be acquired is necessary for the Project;
- 4. The District has offered to purchase the Right of Way in compliance with statutory requirements; and
- 5. The District has statutory authority to acquire the Right of Way by eminent domain.

The following information is provided as a basis for the Board to make the required findings.

- 1. The public interest and necessity require the Project. The District has previously determined, based upon planning and related studies, that a new high school and middle school will be needed to relieve overcrowding in the District's existing schools, including Clovis East High School and Reyburn Intermediate School, as well as to accommodate planned future growth in the Southeast area of the District. The Right of Way is necessary to provide needed infrastructure improvements and for mitigation purposes for the Educational Center, including public street improvements and related purposes to mitigate the impacts of vehicle traffic to and from the Educational Center.
- The Project is planned or located in the manner that would be most compatible with the greatest public good and the least private injury. Traffic and engineering studies and analyses performed by District consultants, including a certain study entitled "Traffic Impact Analysis – Terry Bradley Education Center," prepared by JLB Traffic Engineering, Inc. dated August 2, 2022 ("Traffic Analysis"), have determined that public street improvements are needed at various intersections, including the intersection of East Shields Avenue and North De Wolf Avenue for mitigation purposes in order to accommodate the increased traffic impacts of the current phase of the Educational Center project. Acquisition of the Right of Way is needed to provide for necessary road widening and street improvements at the subject intersection. The Right of Way property contains no building improvements, and the Owners will receive compensation for the landscaping, fencing, access driveway and irrigation facilities that will be impacted by the Right of Way acquisition. The costs of replacing and/or relocating those improvements will be included in the compensation to be paid to the Owners. No persons or business or farming operations will be displaced as a result of the Right of Way acquisition.
- 3. The Right of Way sought to be acquired are necessary for the Project. As indicated above, acquisition of the Right of Way is necessary for the District to meet its objectives for the Project, including fulfilling the mitigation measures requiring improvements to the intersection of East Shields Avenue and North De Wolf Avenue in the vicinity of the Educational Center in order to accommodate the additional traffic anticipated from the opening of the new campus.

- 4. The District has made the statutory offer to purchase the Right of Way from the Owners. The District's offer to the Owners was made by letter dated February 4, 2025. Previous offers were made to the Owners in September and December 2024. The District's offer to purchase the Right of Way before adopting the Resolution fully complied with legal requirements. If the Resolution is adopted, the District is prepared to continue attempts to negotiate with the Owners notwithstanding the initiation of eminent domain proceedings.
- 5. The District has statutory authority to acquire the Right of Way by eminent domain. California Education Code section 35270.5 and Section 19 of Article I of the California Constitution empower the District to acquire the Right of Way by eminent domain. Education Code section 35270.5 provides that "[t]he governing board of any school district may acquire by eminent domain any property necessary to carry out any of the powers or functions of the district." As the governing board of a public school district, the Board has the authority under the California Constitution and the Education Code to make the findings described herein and to authorize the initiation of eminent domain proceedings to acquire the Right of Way.

Notices of this hearing on the proposed Resolution of Necessity and of the opportunity to appear at the hearing and be heard regarding the required findings was given to the Owners by letter dated February 4, 2025.

As stated above, the proposed Resolution of Necessity adopting the above findings must be voted on and passed by a two-thirds vote of the Board (Code of Civil Procedure section 1245.360). Should the Board adopt the Resolution of Necessity, the findings are supported by the record. The probable amount of compensation for the fair market value for the Right of Way, based upon the appraisal of Gregg Palmer, MAI, will be deposited with the State Treasurer's Office in order to establish the date of value after adoption of the Resolution.

#### FISCAL IMPACT

The fair market value of the Right of Way is \$150,000.00 according to the District's appraiser, Gregg Palmer, plus payment of court costs to the extent charged against public agencies. The final cost of the Right of Way will be determined either by court proceedings in eminent domain or by a negotiated settlement in lieu of eminent domain with the Owners subject to approval by the Board.

Students at Buchanan, Clovis, Clovis East, Clovis North, Clovis Online and Clovis West high schools have participated in this program for the past several years. For the District to claim this additional ADA, audit forms will be required to verify that all students participating in the Concurrent Public Higher Education Program summarized above are approved by the Governing Board.

# **DISCUSSION:**

Fresno MSA Limited Partnership is a telecommunications company and does business as Verizon Wireless. Fresno MSA Limited Partnership wishes to install, operate and maintain a communications antenna and related equipment at CHS, on the light tower on the south-east side of Lamonica Stadium (visitor side).

The Option and License Agreement, and License Agreement (Agreement) consists of two parts:

- 1. The first part provides Fresno MSA Limited Partnership with an option to license the designated location on CHS for installation, maintenance and operation of an antenna and related equipment. The option is available to Fresno MSA Limited Partnership for 12 months and requires Fresno MSA Limited Partnership to make payment to the District for the right to the option. The 12-month option provides Fresno MSA Limited Partnership with the time and opportunity to obtain the required certificates, permits and approvals, and to conduct surveys, inspections, structural strength analysis, subsurface soil tests, and other pre-construction work necessary to install the antenna and related equipment.
- 2. If Fresno MSA Limited Partnership timely exercises the option to license the designated location at CHS, the second part of the Agreement provides for Fresno MSA Limited Partnership to install, maintain, and operate the antenna and related equipment and to make payment to the District in return for the right to do so. The initial term is five years and automatically extends for four additional five-year terms subject to termination by Fresno MSA Limited Partnership.

#### **FISCAL IMPACT:**

Payment from Fresno MSA Limited Partnership for the option right in the amount of \$3,450.00 one time and, after exercise of the option, \$41,400.00 annually. At each extension of the agreement, the annual rent will increase by 15%.

# **DISCUSSION:**

Procedures outlined in government-wide regulations at 2 CFR section 200.320(a)(1)(iii) provide that state agencies and program operators are responsible for determining and documenting an appropriate micropurchase threshold based on internal controls, an evaluation of risk, and its documented procurement procedures. The regulations also provide that the micro-purchase threshold used must be authorized or not prohibited under state, local, or tribal laws or regulations. State agencies and program operators may establish a micro-purchase threshold that is higher than the federal threshold established in the Federal Acquisition Regulations (FAR).

Pursuant to 48 CFR section 2.101, an acquisition of supplies or services below the threshold of \$10,000 is, for the purpose of federal law, a "micro-purchase" which does not require formal procurement methods such as competitive bidding. The District is currently bound by the federal micro-purchase threshold of \$10,000 for applicable transactions funded by federal funds. Pursuant to 2 CFR section 200.320, non-federal entities, including local public school districts, may annually self-certify a micro-purchase threshold of up to \$50,000 if (1) the non-federal entity qualifies as a low-risk auditee, (2) the non-federal entity has an annual internal institutional risk assessment to identify, mitigate and manage financial risks, or (3) a higher threshold would be consistent with state law.

The District is requesting approval to self-certify increasing the federal micro-purchase threshold to \$50,000.

# **FISCAL IMPACT:**

Increasing the micro-purchase threshold will result in purchase and project lead time reduction and cost savings.

# SELF-CERTIFYING INCREASED FEDERAL MICRO-PURCHASE THRESHOLD

**WHEREAS**, pursuant to 48 Code of Federal Regulations (CFR) section 2.101, an acquisition of supplies or services below the threshold of \$10,000 is, for the purpose of federal law, a "micro-purchase" which does not require formal procurement methods such as competitive bidding; and

**WHEREAS**, the Clovis Unified School District is currently bound by the federal micropurchase threshold of \$10,000 for applicable transactions funded by federal funds; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to 2 CFR section 200.320, non-federal entities, including local public school districts, may annually self-certify a micro-purchase threshold of up to \$50,000 if (1) the non-federal entity qualifies as a low-risk auditee, (2) the non-federal entity has an annual internal institutional risk assessment to identify, mitigate, and manage financial risks, or (3) a higher threshold would be consistent with state law; and

WHEREAS, the District may permissibly self-certify a higher micro-purchase threshold under the third potential justification set forth above because it would be consistent with state law, since California has higher thresholds. Specifically, California Uniform Public Construction Cost Accounting Act (UPCCAA) allows for purchase orders to be issued for public projects as set forth in Public Contract Code section 22000, a copy of which is attached hereto as Exhibit A; and

WHEREAS, for contracts and purchases for other goods and services, California generally requires competitive bidding for contracts and purchases over \$114,800. This threshold is in accordance with Public Contract Code section 20111(a), as has been adjusted pursuant to statute by the California Department of Education, as documented in the letter attached hereto as Exhibit B; and

**WHEREAS**, in accordance with the above, the District is justified in self-certifying a micro-purchase threshold of \$50,000 for contracts, purchases and for public projects.

# **THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Board as follows:

1. The above recitals are true and correct.

- 2. The Board hereby self-certifies a limit of \$50,000 for federally funded micropurchases provided that such purchases comply with all applicable laws.
- 3. The Board hereby instructs District staff to retain this resolution, as well as its exhibits, for a period of three years, in accordance with 2 CFR § 200.334.

# **EXHIBIT A**

# California Public Contract Code section 22000

# ARTICLE 1. Legislative Intent and Definitions [22000 - 22003] 22000.

This chapter shall be known and may be cited as the "Uniform Public Construction Cost Accounting Act."

# **22001.**

The Legislature finds and declares that there is a statewide need to promote uniformity of the cost accounting standards and bidding procedures on construction work performed or contracted by public entities in the state. This chapter provides for the development of cost accounting standards and an alternative method for the bidding of public works projects by public entities.

#### 22001.5.

On or before January 1, 2009, the Controller shall send a notice to all public agencies describing the provisions of this chapter and the benefits of using its provisions. This notice shall also be included in any notification issued by the Controller pursuant to Section 22020.

# 22002.

- (a) "Public agency," for purposes of this chapter, means a city, county, city and county, including chartered cities and chartered counties, any special district, and any other agency of the state for the local performance of governmental or proprietary functions within limited boundaries. "Public agency" also includes a nonprofit transit corporation wholly owned by a public agency and formed to carry out the purposes of the public agency.
- (b) "Representatives of the construction industry" for purposes of this chapter, means a general contractor, subcontractor, or labor representative with experience in the field of public works construction.
- (c) "Public project" means any of the following:
- (1) Construction, reconstruction, erection, alteration, renovation, improvement, demolition, installation, and repair work involving any publicly owned, leased, or operated facility.
  - (2) Painting or repainting of any publicly owned, leased, or operated facility.
- (3) In the case of a publicly owned electric utility system, "public project" shall include only the construction, erection, improvement, or repair of dams, reservoirs, powerplants, and electrical transmission lines of 230,000 volts and higher.
- (d) "Public project" does not include maintenance work. For purposes of this section, "maintenance work" includes all of the following:
- (1) Routine, recurring, and usual work for the preservation or protection of any publicly owned or publicly operated facility for its intended purposes.
  - (2) Minor repainting.
  - (3) Resurfacing of streets and highways at less than one inch.
- (4) Landscape maintenance, including mowing, watering, trimming, pruning, planting, replacement of plants, and servicing of irrigation and sprinkler systems.
- (5) Work performed to keep, operate, and maintain publicly owned water, power, or waste disposal systems, including, but not limited to, dams, reservoirs, powerplants, and electrical transmission lines of 230,000 volts and higher.

(e) For purposes of this chapter, "facility" means any plant, building, structure, ground facility, utility system, subject to the limitation found in paragraph (3) of subdivision (c), real property, streets and highways, or other public work improvement.

#### 22003.

A public agency which has, by resolution, elected to become subject to the uniform construction cost accounting procedures set forth in Article 2 (commencing with Section 22010), may utilize the bidding procedures set forth in Article 3 (commencing with Section 22030) when contracting for "maintenance work," as defined in Section 22002, or when contracting for any other work which does not fall within the definition of "public project," as defined in Section 22002.

#### Annual Adjustment to Bid Threshold for Contracts Awarded by School Districts

Public Contract Code (PCC) Section 2011(a) requires school district governing boards to competitively bid and award any contracts involving an expenditure of more than \$50,000, adjusted for inflation, to the lowest responsible bidder. Contracts subject to competitive bidding include:

- 1. Purchase of equipment, materials, or supplies to be furnished, sold, or leased to the school district.
- 2. Services that are not construction services.
- 3. Repairs, including maintenance as defined in PCC Section 20115, that are not public projects as defined in PCC Section 22002(c).

The State Superintendent of Public Instruction (State Superintendent) is required to annually adjust the \$50,000 amount specified in PCC Section 2011(a) to reflect the percentage change in the annual average value of the Implicit Price Deflator for State and Local Government Purchases of Goods and Services for the United States, as published by the United States Department of Commerce, Bureau of Economic Analyst (BEA) for the 12-month period ending in the prior fiscal year. The inflation adjustment is rounded to the nearest one hundred dollars (\$100).

Pursuant to the above calculation, and effective January 1, 2025, the State Superintendent has determined that the inflation adjusted bid thresholds for the current and two prior years.

Calendar Year	Bid Threehold	Percentage Change in implicit Price Defiator
2023	\$109,300	10.32%
2024	\$114,500	4.79%
2025	\$114,600	0.259%

Also note that public projects as defined in PCC Section 22002(c), such as construction or reconstruction of publicly owned facilities, have a lower bid threshold of \$15,000 that is not adjusted for inflation. For more information on bidding requirements for all projects, refer to PCC sections 20110 to 20116.4.
